The Merkland management unit, covering 681.0ha, is a forest block just to the north of Brodick on the Isle of Arran. It is part of Scotland's national forests and land owned by the Scottish Ministers on behalf of the people of Scotland and managed by Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS).

The Merkland Land Management Plan (LMP) defines the management prescriptions for the next 10 years (2021-2031) and presents the vision for the long term management of the area.

The main management objectives in this plan focus on landscape, access and health and sustainable timber production.

An Analysis and Concept map has been produced to complement this design brief. It presents the draft management objectives and highlights the opportunities and constraints for key issues.

The concept for the LMP focuses on delivering relevant National Policy and has been developed around the following key drivers:

- Scotland's Forestry Strategy 2019-2029
- Forestry and Land Scotland Corporate Plan 2019-2022

The plan will contribute to the first three outcomes of the Forestry and Land Scotland Corporate Plan (outcomes 4 and 5 relate to the organisational structure and business performance of FLS) as shown in the following table (operational actions not relevant to this plan have been greyed out).
