Summary of Glen Nevis Land Management Plan 2015 - 2025 Proposals

Glen Nevis Forest lies to the south of the town of Fort William and faces the principal approach to Ben Nevis. The final sections of the West Highland Way pass through the forest. The land covered by the plan is a mixture of commercial forest, native woodland and open habitat rising from the sheltered floor of Glen Nevis to Mullach nan Coirean at over 3000ft. The area is of high scenic value and popular for recreation. Cow Hill is readily accessible from the town.

The plan objectives are to increase the amount of native woodland and create more natural woodland that complements the dramatic landscape of the Glen. Commercial conifer and broadleaf will be focused on the more sheltered sites. 160ha of new woodland will be established at Blar a Chaorainn. The open hill will be managed for agricultural production and to enhance its conservation value.

The Glen Nevis land management plan was approved on 20th August 2015 and covers the period from 2015 to 2025.
